# The Monthly Message from Rev'd Susan McIvor

'O that you would tear open the heavens and come down'

Isaiah 64 v 1

Is it me, or does it seem that each year Christmas comes sooner? I was visiting another church in the Derby Methodist Circuit the other day when I spotted a group of children, in full costume, taking part in their nativity play. To me it felt so out of place; the season of Advent, when we get ready for Christmas, had not yet started. Yet presumably out of concern to get everything done a local school was having its nativity performances. Sometimes it seems that we are in such a rush to get everything done for Christmas that we actually miss what it is all really about.

Advent is the Christian season when we look forward to the inbreaking of God into the world; the time when we as Christians wait hopefully for Christ our Redeemer to come. It is the season which reminds us to slow down, to make proper preparations. In Advent we focus on the stories of those who prepared the way for Jesus; the prophets, John the Baptist, Mary the mother of Jesus. In Advent we hear about their great expectations for a different world order. We hear of the deep longing of the people in the Bible to know God more fully. Their stories are characterised by patient witness, long journeys, deep longing and strength of faith. This is a huge contrast with our traditional festivities in the weeks running up to Christmas, characterised by excessive eating, drinking, spending and huge traffic jams of impatient shoppers.

Yet despite the contrast in the ways we prepare for Christmas our need is the same. We still cry out for God to 'tear open the heavens and come down' as the prophet Isaiah did many centuries before us.

There are times when we long for God to do something dramatic in

our world. Why doesn't God intervene when people are destroying each other through war, we wonder. Or when natural disasters destroy lives and communities we ask why God didn't stop it from happening? We long for God to intervene in our world. 'O that you would tear open the heavens and come down'.

There are times when we long for God to do something dramatic in our lives. When we are locked in by our own anxiety or despair, or shut ourselves away because of anger or guilt, often we find ourselves praying for God to help us. When we are overcome by pain or facing serious illness we pray to God to do something. When we think we don't have enough faith we ask to know God better. We long for God to intervene in our lives. 'O that you would tear down the heavens and come down'.

There are times when we long for God to do something dramatic in the lives of people we know. We pray for miracles for our loved ones and sometimes we pray for God's judgment on those who hurt or harm us or those whom we love. We pray for God to intervene in the lives of people we know.


So I think we are not that different from Isaiah, who with his people, longed to know God more fully and longed for God to break into their lives, the lives of the people whom they loved and the world. Our desperate prayers tell us we still long for God to intervene in our world today. 'O that you would tear open the heavens and come down'.

But one question remains. Will we be ready when he comes?

May God bless you all as you prepare for Christ's coming amongst us again.

# R & R Group update.

This morning you will have entered the Church through the new Foyer which was handed over to us on Friday afternoon (2<sup>nd</sup> December). We do hope you enjoyed the experience and were able to appreciate how



much bigger it seems on the inside than it looks on the outside. If you are a Dr. Who fan you might think of it as the 'Tardis' effect. If you are not a Dr. Who fan then you will have no idea what we are talking about!!!!

The overall cost of the work is around £200,000 and we have achieved that with just two significant grants, the Derby Methodist Circuit (£20,000) and the URC East Midlands Synod (£10,000). So well done to everyone who has contributed over the years to make this happen.

Of course, we have had to borrow £40,000 to get to where we are and this will have to be repaid over the next 5 years so we cannot let up in our fund raising or giving until that is done.

Of course, now you can see the work is done, we hope you will be encouraged to continue to give to our Building Works Fund and if you are one of those who has not yet taken to supporting this, you may now be inspired to do so.

We now have a watertight building with the new roof and a lovely light and open area as we arrive and it is warmer; we have much to thank God for.

There will be a formal event soon to commemorate and bless the work that has been done, please look out for that date.

You will see hanging in in the Foyer our lovely new 'Christmas' Cross' to compliment our existing 'Easter Cross' in the front bay of the Church. Mike Prince got the cross made and he has added the frame, our thanks to him and the anonymous donor who made it possible.



#### Gift Aid

Thank you to those of you who are able to Gift Aid your offering money and if you have already done so, thank you for completing our new form. We are doing this because those nice people at the Inland Revenue have revised the wording for the Gift Aid Form and we have decided that all those who Gift Aid their money to the Church should complete the new form. So if you are already registered with us for Gift Aid and have NOT yet completed the new for, please see Margaret Platt or Ian Sant to get one (rather than wait to be approached!)

If you pay tax and are not already registered with us to enable us to claim Gift Aid, again see Margaret or Ian.

By completing the form, it does NOT cost you any more but enables us to claim from the Inland Revenue a further 25p for every £1 you give.

Interestingly, we get about £4,000 each year from the Inland Revenue and this is helping us enormously to meet our costs so it is very much worth doing.
